Quick Facts

Children's uninsurance rates in Lee County have declined by 33.7% since 2011 due to expanded access to coverage provided by Medicaid, NC Health Choice, and the Affordable Care Act.

There are 58,908 residents in Lee County, including 7,475 children ages birth to eight.

Lee's child population is 21.4% African American, 1.2% Asian or Pacific Islander, 0.5% Native American or Alaska Native, 31.2% Hispanic or Latinx, and 45.7% White.¹
